- The topic tonight is homemade "Jigs and Fixtures" that help you get your job done.
- Current membership reported art approximate 120.

Message from the President:

Hopefully the winter weather is behind us as the spring flowers and trees are now in full bloom. I hope that everyone had a great Easter with their families and are getting to spend a little more time in the shop as we get into the warmer weather.



Last month Jim Duxbury scheduled homemade tools, jigs and fixtures as the monthly demo. This was the first time we had tried something like that and you never know quite how it will turn out. I have to say that everything went pretty well. There was a lot

of participation from our members, many of whom were speaking in front of the group for the first time. Things transitioned pretty smoothly from one demonstrator to another and we even ended on time. I would like to thank everyone who participated for making this demo the success that it was. I would also like to thank Jim Duxbury for the great idea of having such a demo. Everyone in attendance should have gone home with a few new tricks.

Our featured demonstrator for April is Charles Farrar. Originally from Southern Virginia, Charles now lives in Concord, NC and is a member of the Southern Piedmont Woodturners in Concord. Charles will be demonstrating his technique for creating a hammered finish hollowform. This technique can really set a piece apart from the crowd and for those of you who haven't seen it done, you are in for a treat. For photos of Charles

- Bob Holtji reported \$6300.00 in the treasury.
 - Bob Muir reported on the upcoming NC Woodturners Symposium. It will take place at the Greensboro Coliseum in November.
 - There were 15 “Jigs & Fixtures” presentations as follows.
1. Jim Stone - Doughnut holder, depth gauge, jamb chuck and turquoise stone crusher.
 2. Lan Brady - Homemade vacuum pump system with various adapters for 1” and 1 1/4” lathes.
 3. Jim Terry - Velcro sanding ball for inside of vessels, various bedan, gouges, skewers. Homemade tool tray that fits onto the lathe raceway.
 4. Dave MacInnis - Special grind bedan and jig to make collars and rings.
 5. John Morris - Homemade versions of E-Z Wood tools, old golf club grips for tip covers, the use of multiple sanding pads and ways to make your own pads. 2X4 board with 80 grit to square the face of each segmented layer, band clamps (heating duct w/hinged worm screw) of various sizes. Segmented assembly jigs.
 6. Robert DeHart - Homemade bowl steady consisting of an air conditioner fan motor mounting ring, metal from local hardware store and inline roller skate wheels. Also, a hollowing system constructed of metal which articulates on an axis parallel to the lathe bed. Plans and instructions can be seen at www.woodennicol.com.
 7. Harry Sample - Bowl Chuck with velcro straps and vinyl sheet sewn together to hold object for finishing to foot.
 8. Bob Moffett - Many uses for magnets for holding tools, jigs and equipment to your lathe such as dust collector hood, chuck key, power strip, tape measure. Plywood tool holder that fits into your banjo, indexing wheel with magnetic arm.
 9. Robert Lunsford - Lexan log centering template, detail tool made from hex keys, depth gauge for bowls, tenon templates of various sizes to match each set of chuck jaws, centering jig, shock absorber rod for turning tool shafts. Robert also demonstrated a fire started made from a turned brass cylinder a dowel.
 10. George Sudermann - Use old wrenches for sizing multiple tenons. Sharpen the short leg of wrench and slide into the workpiece as you would a parting tool.
 11. Jim Duxbury - Wood handle for chuck wrench, hex wrench, grind jig, table saw blade height adjustment jig and many other ideas.

12. Steve Coley - EZ Wood Tool handles, Lazy Susan tool holder stand, HDMI plastic drill jig.
 13. Jim Barber - Large plate holder made of plywood.
 14. Julien McCarthy - Rolls of self adhesive velcro (coins) to make your own sanding disc pads.
 15. Doc Green - Jig to cut nails for making rolling pin handles that roll independently.
 16. Earl Kennedy - Sharpening jig for gouges to grind a 1/16” bevel, air reciprocating hacksaw modified for sanding in deep objects.

FROM WEST OF GREENSBORO

Take I-40 East to Exit 212 (Bus-40 Greensboro To Bryan Blvd). Exit is from the right lane.
At the top of the Exit 212 ramp take Exit 24 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.
Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.
Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.
As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come to the intersection of Ballinger Rd.
Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM EAST OF GREENSBORO

Take Bus-40 through Greensboro
Take Exit 212 (To Bryan Blvd. PTI Airport). You will now be headed north on the new highway.
Exit the new highway onto W. Friendly Ave. and go left (west) on W. Friendly.
Go about ¼ mile west on W. Friendly to Chimney Rock Rd. and turn right (north at traffic light) on Chimney Rock Rd.
As Chimney Rock Rd. parallels the new highway, you will come the intersection of Ballinger Rd.
Turn right on Ballinger and go under the new highway. Shortly beyond the overpass Leonard Recreation Center will be on your left.

FROM THE NORTH SIDE OF GREENSBORO *Note: Ballinger Rd. is now open.* Ballinger turns west from New Garden / Guilford College Rd. just north of Guilford College. The following link to Mapquest will detail this area. Directions from Bus-40 to Guilford College Rd have been removed since the above directions are much faster from Bus-40.
